The Sacraments: The Graces of Baptism

There are specific graces that flow from each of the sacraments. As the Catechism states, baptism holds a special place among all of the sacraments. Specifically, Paragraph 1213 teaches that 'Holy Baptism is the basis of the whole Christian life, the gateway to life in the Spirit and the door which gives access to the other sacraments.' From this statement it should be easy to see that baptism is absolutely central to what it means to be a Christian. In fact, no other sacrament can be received in the absence of baptism.

But what are the specific graces that are received in baptism? First and foremost of the spiritual effects of baptism is the forgiveness of sin. At the moment of baptism, all preceding sins and their temporal effects are washed away. For the infant who is baptized, Original Sin is forgiven. Original Sin, also known as the sin of Adam, is not a personal sin of the infant since an infant is not capable of rationally choosing to do evil or rationally choosing to refuse to do good. No, Original Sin is that lack of righteousness before God we all suffer from because Adam and Eve chose to disobey God. God intended that we be born with the same graces that Adam and Eve enjoyed – walking and talking with God in a natural paradise where suffering and toil were minimal and death was not a part of our lives – but all of that was lost for us through their sin. Their sin ruptured the relationship between man and God such that man is now alienated from his Creator by nature and therefore has no claim on a relationship with God and no claim on eternal life in heaven by birth. For the adult who is baptized, Original Sin is wiped away as are the personal sins committed prior to rebirth in the waters of baptism.

The second grace of baptism is spiritual rebirth, being reborn by water and the Holy Spirit. In the waters of baptism we sacramentally die and rise with Jesus, we become partakers of His suffering, death, and resurrection. This spiritual rebirth reestablishes the relationship we were meant to have with God making us sons and daughters of the Father. Unlike Adam and Eve, we are not sons and daughters by creation but by re-creation. Unlike Adam and Eve, through baptism we are not sons and daughters of God by nature but by grace, we are sons and daughters of the Father not by birth but by adoption. Through baptism we can now boldly call God our Father and we become brothers and sisters of Christ through adoption such that we are also coheirs of His inheritance.

Besides being reborn, besides becoming a new creation in Christ by our baptism, we are also incorporated into the Church. This is much more than filling out a form so as to join an organization. No, we are literally incorporated into the Church. At its very root, the word incorporate means to be embodied, to be formed into a body. In the case of baptism, we are incorporated into the mystical Body of Christ that is the Church. In baptism we become members of Christ, not in the sense of being a member of a club, but in the sense that we are members of a body just as our livers and toes and arms are physical members of our own bodies.

And since we are all part of one body – the Church – by virtue of our baptism, we are all members of one another as well: baptism unites us spiritually. We have a unity by our baptism in the sense that we are all brothers and sisters in Christ but also in the sense that we share one another's burdens, joys, sufferings, aspirations, longings, etc. By baptism we are meant to have a common faith, a common hope in what Jesus has promised us, a common loving concern for one another, and a common eternal destiny with all of the baptized whether they are living, dead, or yet to be born.

Lastly, baptism marks us spiritually in a way that cannot be undone or erased. We are indelibly marked as belonging to Jesus. We are irreversibly and eternally consecrated such that we can always be identified as sons and daughters of God irrespectively of how we might have betrayed that consecration through grievous sin. We are tabernacles of the Holy Spirit by baptism even if we have evicted the Holy Spirit from our lives through mortal sin. Indeed, we are configured to Christ forever even if we later chose a different master than our Lord. Indeed, Christ has a claim on the baptized man even if that man later rejects His dominion.
