COVID-19 RESPONSE, MASS & DEVOTIONS: We have an additional Sunday Latin Mass at 7:30, to aid in social distancing, and continues on a provisional basis.

NOTE ON CONFESSIONS: If there is a significant line for confession, Fr Booth might say part of the formula of absolution while the penitent recites the act of contrition. The full formula of absolution is always said, but the first part might be said softly during the act of contrition. Thus, you might only hear "and I absolve you from your sins, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

ADDITIONAL NOTE ON CONFESSIONS: Beginning in Lent we will begin using a new formula for absolution that reads: "God, the Father of mercies, through the death and resurrection of his Son has reconciled the world to himself and **poured out** the Holy Spirit for the forgiveness of sins; through the ministry of the Church may God **grant** you pardon and peace, and I absolve you from your sins in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." (Changes in Bold).

Joy Among the Woes

Several American banks have gone under in the last few weeks. Several foreign banks seem to be on the brink of doing the same. Politicians are trying to tell us all is well, that these are isolated problems, but financial experts are disagreeing with the politicians' talking points. This might just be the beginning of more bank failures. Then again, unless other banks falter in the next few weeks, we will likely move on to the next cat video, tick tack craze, or facepage post and put the failure of a few smaller regional banks out of our minds. Evidence of this is that no one is talking about the collapse of the FTX cryptocurrency trading exchange any more, which happened only about four months ago. We have certainly forgotten about the 2008 collapse of Bear Stearns, Wachovia, Lehman Bros., and others as well as government bailouts for AIG, Royal Bank of Scotland, Freddie Mac, Fanny Mae, and others. We have also forgotten that politicians, especially Congress, were partially to blame for the 2008 financial collapse. Governmental regulations forced banks to lend to unqualified buyers, many of whom predictably defaulted on their mortgages, and the same politicians blamed greedy bankers for making risky and unprofitable loans in the first place.

Speaking of halfwit politicians, we are making World War III more probable through a bizarre combination of incompetence, bravado, weakness, and wokeness. How close are we to being drawn into actual combat in the Russia-Ukraine war? Probably very close since the Russians deliberately attacked and destroyed one of our surveillance drones in international airspace. We even have video of the attack. Is an attack on a manned airplane next? On one of our warships? On an airliner? Given that we are arming the Ukrainians and training them, as well as propping them up financially, it is not too far a stretch for the Russians to claim that we are already at war with them. We might have even destroyed their gas pipeline to Europe. What do we gain by playing this game? Ukraine is not a vital ally, they are not important to our national interests, and they are not even a democracy. They are as corrupt and thuggish as the Russians. Likewise, through woke energy policy we have kept oil prices artificially high so that electric cars might seem viable. Had we kept oil at a lower price through domestic production, Russia could not sell their oil at such a price so as to fund their war with Ukraine.

Then again, in a show of American weakness, we are likely to see China become more aggressive. The weaker we get by giving the Ukrainians more and more of our weapons and munitions, the more and more we get entangled with the Russians, the more and more the Chinese will become aggressive especially against Taiwan. Taiwan is definitely a democracy and they are vital to our interests, especially when it comes to technology.

We also have a share of our own domestic woes. We have had a rash of train derailments in the last month. We have no idea how bad the environmental damage might be in East Palestine, Ohio. Why is East Palestine not a federal disaster area? We have had some very close calls when it comes to air traffic control of recent. In one case, an airliner was cleared to land on the same runway at the same time as another airliner was taking off. This is just one of many recent near misses. We have persistent inflation, the housing market is going wonky, violent crime continues to increase, more dangerous drugs are crossing our borders, our borders are utterly insecure, more evidence piles up pointing to serious vaccine injuries, we have children being mutilated in the name of affirming their confusion, we have teachers and some parents confusing children into getting mutilated, we have a human trafficking problem, our schools are failing at all levels, and the list of woes goes on seemingly for ever.

So, the Church chooses the fourth Sunday of Lent, Laetare Sunday, to remember rejoicing. Given the times we live in and the fact that things are getting worse, it is truly appropriate to focus on joy? A little tone deaf perhaps? Nope. We have to remember that nothing that happens in the world, whether locally, nationally, or globally, can erase the joy of God's love for mankind. In Advent we rejoice that Jesus is to be born among us. In Lent we rejoice that Jesus suffered and died out of love for us. And we have a full season, Easter, for rejoicing in the Resurrection.
