Playing God: What could Go Wrong?

Instead of accepting the reality that God made us male and female, instead of recognizing long-settled scientific aspects of human anatomy, some people today seem to think that human gender is malleable, and if not malleable, subject to our own designs. What this essentially means is that people are playing god with their own lives, and more alarmingly, playing god with the lives of others. This is hardly new. Eve, and probably Adam too, wanted to be like God. Cain exercised power over life and death. Mankind aspired to be like gods when they tried to ascend into heaven by the Tower of Babel. Instead of accepting that we are made in God's own image, most fully expressed as male and female, we often choose create our own gods. This has been a problem with mankind from early times and it continues today. Yes, we might not fashion a statue or image and literally worship the work of our own hands, but we will happily worship and serve the things we value. Fame, money, power, possessions, pleasure, and all of the other things we are prone to crave can effectively replace God.

We don't always see the potential harm in playing God. In fact, we can tell ourselves that playing God is necessary, beneficial, or an imperative. The nazis played God with the Jews, not only exploiting them as slave labor and exterminating them, but using them as test subjects in some of the most horrific experiments for the sake of advancing scientific knowledge. Imperial Japan did much the same with the Chinese and prisoners of war. We can tell ourselves that modern society would never do such crimes against humanity, but we would be fooling ourselves. While we might not subject humans to unspeakable horrors in the name of science, we can certainly play God in other ways.

We have selectively bred plants and animals for centuries. This could easily be seen as part of subduing the earth, as is part of our God-given commission to "Be fertile and multiply; fill the earth and subdue it. Have dominion over the fish of the sea, the birds of the air, and all the living things that crawl on the earth" (Gen 1:28). Such legitimate dominion surely has limits that ought not be transgressed. For example, was the gain of function research, which more than likely created the virus that has plagued the whole world for the last three years, truly necessary? Why? So that we can defend ourselves against future pandemics? Really? That did not seem to go so well, did it? Not having learned from this, not even admitting responsibility, it has been reported that the federal government has recently resumed funding for continued bat virus gain of function research. This is hardly breeding better tomatoes or cows that produce more milk. This is hardly cross-breeding different varieties of wheat to make a heartier, more drought-resistant strain. Creating new viruses that are highly infectious to humans is a good thing? A responsible thing? A wise thing?

Likewise, we are witnessing the birth of artificial intelligence. Of all creatures, only the angels and mankind have been endowed with intelligence. Our intelligence is balanced by wisdom, conscience, and an innate moral compass. We are also, whether we know or like it or not, answerable to a Higher Power. Will the artificial intelligence we create have wisdom? A conscience? A moral compass? Whose moral compass? Will it be answerable to its human creators as we are answerable to God? What values will self-aware artificial intelligence manifest? Will human life be sacred to artificial intelligence or will it see mankind as a nuisance, regard us a means to an end, or enslave us for its own purposes? If, in our arrogance, we create artificial intelligence thinking that we know what we are doing, can we expect what we create to be humble? Various science fiction writers have warned us of the perils of artificial intelligence for the last seventy years. Art warns science and rightly so.

We have an arrogance that is often our undoing. We do not see the full consequences of our actions and can hardly imagine the future impact of all that we do. Japan has contracepted and aborted itself to the point that its population is nearing collapse. The same can be said of Italy, Spain, Portugal, and a host of other countries. We are not far behind. Contraception and abortion were supposed to improve lives, not put whole countries, regions, and perhaps the whole human race in jeopardy. Are we sowing the wind so as to reap the whirlwind?
