Endure in the Faith

A few weeks ago, the topics of anger, fear, hatred, and disgust were discussed. Anger usually arises from suffering an injustice or a perceived injustice. Fear, in the negative sense of the word, is a response to danger, pain, suffering, or hardship. Fear, in the positive sense of the word, pertains to deep and profound respect and awe of something or someone greater or more powerful than ourselves. Positive fear can be taught, such as a fisherman teaching his son to fear the sea, not just because of the dangers involved with fishing, but also because of the immenseness and power possessed by large bodies of water. They'd be fools not to respect the sea. Likewise, the fear of the Lord can also be taught: "*The fear of the Lord is pure, enduring forever. The statutes of the Lord are true, all of them just*" (Ps 19:10), "*Come, children, listen to me; I will teach you fear of the Lord*" (Ps 34:12), "*Fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge; fools despise wisdom and discipline. Hear, my son, your father's instruction, and reject not your mother's teaching*" (Prov 1:7-8), "*Instruct the wise, and they become still wiser; teach the just, and they advance in learning. The beginning of wisdom is fear of the Lord, and knowledge of the Holy One is understanding*" (Prov 9:9-10).

Anger and negative fear can lead to hatred. Hatred can be simply emotional, but long lasting hatred is usually chosen. I can be angry with the government but I would be a fool to hate it. Hating the corruption, incompetence, injustice, and indifference in an otherwise good form of government is a more rational response. I can fear bees and do my best to avoid them, but what do I gain by choosing to hate them? Bees do what bees do, and if I get stung, it is either an unfortunate consequence of bee behavior or the result of my doing something stupid.

Disgust can be innate, such as the normal response to the smell of rotting food or the smell of a skunk. We do not have to teach people to be disgusted with unpleasant sights or smells. Perhaps we instinctively know that foul smells usually come from things that are unhealthy or threats to our wellbeing. There are also things that disgust that are hardly universal, things that are more unique to individuals, such as a disgust for the smell of cooking meat, disgust for a food or drink that might have made someone quite sick, or even disgust for themselves. However, disgust can also be taught.

Indeed, it is not uncommon for people to teach their kids and for governments to teach their people to be disgusted by others who look, think, believe, worship, or live in a way that is regarded as unacceptable, contemptible, or worse. It is no secret that the nazis tapped into a growing anti-semitism in Europe, they were able to make Jews the source of disgust for millions of people. This made it easy for many well educated and law abiding Germans to help persecute the Jews or at least stand idly by while their neighbors were rounded up and slaughtered. Much the same indoctrination continues to happen in some circles of islam, that Israel and all Jews must be exterminated. The Armenians, Christians living in modern day Turkey, have also suffered genocide because generations of Turks have been taught that they are despicable people worthy of extermination. Some would say that the nazis simply hated the Jews, that some muslims simply hate Israel and the Jews, and that the Turks simply hate the Armenians. But could anyone imagine the nazis teaming up with the Jews for the sake of a common cause? Would Iran ever become allied with Israel or the Turks to collaborate with the Armenians? When disgust has been instilled in a population, there is no common ground to the found, there is no unifying principle that could bring those who are disgusted together with the ones they disgust. Where is there room for compromise when extermination is the ultimate goal?

Sadly, disgust for Christians has been growing for some time. While this might be part of the ever present tension between the worldly and the believer, it might also be the beginnings of disgust rising to the levels seen with the nazis, the Turks, hard-line muslims, and others throughout history. Yes, Jesus warned us that the world will hate us on account of Him (Mt 10:22, Mk 13:13, Lk 21:17), but our response remains the same in the face of hatred or disgust: "You will be hated by all because of my name, but whoever endures to the end will be saved" (Mt 10:22). -Fr Booth
