Persecutions, Pandemics, and Precepts

Given that there are signs of upcoming persecution, which may or may not occur, which may or may not be comprehensive in scope, and which may or may not become violent in nature, it would be good to review and to consider what our basic duties as Catholics are. Even if persecution never occurs, noises are being made about the return of mandatory lockdowns, mandates, and restrictions like we saw early in the recent pandemic. Our governments, media, and medical establishments are not being honest about how these measures failed to prevent infection, failed to flatten the curve, failed to prevent hospitalization, failed to protect the most vulnerable, and proved anything but safe and effective, so we can expect these useless measures to return to the extent that our politicians are more eager to control us than to serve us. The recent pandemic showed to what extent lust for power and lust for money can corrupt our public servants. If those in control were interested in serving us, they'd be asking why the Swedes did better, the Haitians did better, and most of Africa did better than we did during the pandemic despite the fact that we had the most vaccines and the best medical care available. For example, Americans died at a per capita rate forty-five times higher than the people of Haiti. Given the massive disparities between our two countries, even if the number who died in Haiti is under reported, we would expect that number to be reversed especially if the vaccines, lockdowns, and other restrictions were as effective as we have been told. If honesty, integrity, accountability, and transparency are lacking in those with power, can we expect our human and civil rights to be respected?

If we have civil and human rights, that means we have duties as well. No true right exists that does not have corresponding duties. If one claims a right that has no duties, then it is not a true right. As Christians, we have the right to believe what God has revealed, we have the right to worship as the Church has specified, we have the right to pray, and we have the right to exercise our faith inside and outside of the confines of our homes and our churches. Such rights are actually duties in and of themselves. Some of these rights were curtailed or usurped in various ways during the pandemic (and at other times in history), such as the government demanding the closure of churches, but even so, does the suppression of our rights negate the duties that correspond to those rights? In the general sense, no. For example, if all of our parishes were forced to close, we'd still have the basic obligations that surround the commandment to observe the sabbath. How? By remembering the sabbath and keeping it holy to the best of our ability under the circumstances we find ourselves in.

So, besides the duty to pray, obey God's commandments, and the general exercise of the faith, what are our most basic duties as Christians? The Precepts of the Church are a good starting point. According to paragraph 432 of the Compendium of the Catechism, these duties are:

- 1. to attend Mass on Sundays and other holy days of obligation and to refrain from work and activities which could impede the sanctification of those days;
- 2. to confess one's sins, receiving the sacrament of Reconciliation at least once each year;
- 3. to receive the sacrament of the Eucharist at least during the Easter season;
- 4. to abstain from eating meat and to observe the days of fasting established by the Church.
- 5. to help to provide for the material needs of the Church, each according to his own ability.

A sixth precept was specified until recently: to observe the laws of the Church concerning marriage. However, that this has ceased to be listed as a precept of the Church does not mean we can ignore the marriage laws of the Church. In any case, these six things are obligatory on all Catholics even during pandemics and persecutions.
