Serious Business

The Catechism states that 'The precepts of the Church are set in the context of a moral life bound to and nourished by liturgical life. The obligatory character of these positive laws decreed by the pastoral authorities is meant to guarantee to the faithful the indispensable minimum in the spirit of prayer and moral effort, in the growth in love of God and neighbor: The first precept ("You shall attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation.") requires the faithful to participate in the Eucharistic celebration when the Christian community gathers together on the day commemorating the Resurrection of the Lord' (CCC 2041-2042). This first precept requires us to keep the sabbath holy by participating in the holiest thing possible in this world, the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. This obligation applies to all Sundays (and holy days of obligation) and is part of observing the 3rd Commandment. Man, left to himself, will find little time for God in his life but will fill what belongs to God with trivial, mundane, and unworthy pursuits. Paragraph 2176 of the Catechism states that 'The celebration of Sunday observes the moral commandment inscribed by nature in the human heart to render to God an outward, visible, public, and regular worship as a sign of his universal beneficence to all. Sunday worship fulfills the moral command of the Old Covenant, taking up its rhythm and spirit in the weekly celebration of the Creator and Redeemer of his people.' Almost all peoples, even those cultures who are far removed from Judeo-Christian roots, tend to take off one day out of seven. More and more, this day of rest is used selfishly and absent any recognition of God.

Once a selfish attitude takes hold regarding the use of our time, anything that impinges upon or hinders the use of our time as we see fit becomes onerous. If we can overcome this selfishness, the participation in the Mass is hardly the burden that many people make it out to be. It is roughly one hour, plus commute time, dedicated to worshipping and thanking the One who created us, the One who sustains us, the One who saves us, and the One who loves us much more than we can comprehend. Yet many people today can't be bothered to attend Mass. They will spend more time going out to get coffee or watching cat videos or using social media or some other trivial pursuit than they would have spent by attending Sunday Mass. To put this in perspective, do we imagine many, or even any, people lamenting on their deathbed not having had more coffee, seen more cat videos, or tweeting more inane information? If they have any religious orientation whatsoever, it is much more likely that they will regret not having been better at attending Mass on Sundays, among other moral regrets. And if they do not regret this on their deathbed, it is entirely possible that they will eternally regret not having taken the Sunday Mass obligation more seriously once they pass from this world.

In this day of moral laxity, that last statement sounds harsh. After all, deliberately choosing to skip Mass to sleep in, to play golf, to play video games, to use social media, or whatever is not like killing someone or robbing a bank. It seems to be such a small thing. It seems a small thing until we understand that we are disrespecting an infinite and all powerful God. God has a right to all of our time but asks for a mere hour a week for Mass and a day a week for our benefit and the benefit of our families. The gravity of the Sunday Mass Obligation is largely lost on people today, but that should not be the case. If it does not seem to us as serious as violating the 5th or the 7th Commandments, we have to remember that deliberately missing Sunday Mass for trivial or selfish reasons is a violation of the 3rd Commandment, a commandment that pertains to offenses primarily against God Himself.

Thus, the Catechism goes on to teach that 'The Sunday Eucharist is the foundation and confirmation of all Christian practice. For this reason the faithful are obliged to participate in the Eucharist on days of obligation, unless excused for a serious reason (for example, illness, the care of infants) or dispensed by their own pastor. Those who deliberately fail in this obligation commit a grave sin' (CCC 2181). Any unrepented grave sin done with deliberation and reflection can deprive us of the grace of the indwelling of the Holy Spirit, the graces necessary for our salvation, as thoroughly as committing murder, committing adultery, or robbing a bank.
