The Second Precept

So, the first precept of the Church – to attend Mass on Sundays and other holy days of obligation and to refrain from work and activities which could impede the sanctification of those days – requires us to do something, which can be hindered by forces beyond our control, such as weather, traffic, health, and other aspects of modern life, or can be rendered impossible for many of the same reasons. Being late for reasons beyond our control incurs no sin. To miss Mass for reasons or circumstances beyond our control incurs no sin. To leave Mass early for serious reasons, reasons commensurate with the solemn duty to attend Mass from beginning to end, incurs no sin. Arriving late, leaving early, or not attending incurs no sin for daily Masses. Likewise, honest mistakes incur no sin. However, regarding obligatory Masses, to knowingly and willingly miss Mass without a good and just reason is sinful. To willingly or carelessly arrive late without a good and just reason is sinful. And to depart Mass early willingly without a proportionately serious reason is sinful.

These are not just arbitrary rules that we might be breaking. No, this is an aspect of observing the Third Commandment. All of the Ten Commandments must be seen as serious business and they exist in order to help us quantify, at least in basic terms, what it means to love God above all things and to love our neighbors as ourselves. Surely our love for God impels us to attend Mass, from beginning to end, on all Sundays and holy days of obligation. It would be hard to argue that we love God while disobeying or neglecting what He has asked of us.

Nevertheless, we will find ourselves sinning against God and neighbor, not just regarding Mass attendance, but also in many other aspects of our lives. Again, the bar for sin is fairly low. We sin if the act itself is sinful, or if our intention is sinful, or if circumstances make an otherwise good act sinful. The act, the intention, and the circumstances must all be good for any act we do, whether in thought or deed, in commission or omission, to be good. Thus, many of the things we do will be sinful. For the sin to be mortal, the act itself must be serious, it must be done deliberately, and it must be knowingly. Thus, while the bar for sin is low, the bar for mortal sin is much higher. If all three conditions for a mortal sin are not met, then the sin is venial.

We must remember that mortal sin ruptures our relationship with God. When we sin mortally, we invite the Holy Spirit to depart from our souls such that we are no longer in a state of grace. Living in a state of mortal sin places our entry into heaven in grave jeopardy. Dying with mortal sin on our soul ought be one of our greatest fears, arguably the greatest of fears: The Catechism makes this clear, 'The teaching of the Church affirms the existence of hell and its eternity. Immediately after death the souls of those who die in a state of mortal sin descend into hell, where they suffer the punishments of hell, eternal fire. The chief punishment of hell is eternal separation from God, in whom alone man can possess the life and happiness for which he was created and for which he longs' (CCC 1035). Thus, we must be earnest about being cleansed from all mortal sin. This is not something that we simply get around to... someday. The *Imitation of Christ* expresses this urgency as follows: 'Every action of yours, every thought, should be those of one who expects to die before the day is out. Death would have no great terrors for you if you had a quiet conscience. Then why not keep clear of sin instead of running away from death? If you are not fit to face death today, it is very unlikely you will be tomorrow' (Book 1, Chapter 23).

Yes, we can dodge death, but it will inexorably catch up to us. This is an absolute certainty. Also an absolute certainty is God's mercy and the forgiveness that is made available through the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus. That mercy is first tasted in the sacrament of baptism where we receive the Holy Spirit and are made His tabernacles. Later falling into sin, it is then through the sacrament of confession, that we can restore the Holy Spirit's presence in our souls. This is why the Church has specified the second precept, which states that there is a duty to confess one's sins, receiving the sacrament of Reconciliation at least once each year.
