The Former Sixth Precept of the Church

Since September of last year we have covered the Precepts of the Church, the bare minimum responsibilities we have as Catholics beyond the duties of loving God first above all, loving neighbors as ourselves, and following God's Law, with faith and hope, as it is written on our hearts, written in the Bible, and handed on to us in Sacred Tradition. For the sake of review, these precepts are as follows:

- 1. to attend Mass on Sundays and other holy days of obligation and to refrain from work and activities which could impede the sanctification of those days;
- to confess one's sins, receiving the sacrament of Reconciliation at least once each year;
- 3. to receive the sacrament of the Eucharist at least during the Easter season;
- 4. to abstain from eating meat and to observe the days of fasting established by the Church.
- 5. to help to provide for the material needs of the Church, each according to his own ability.

A sixth precept has been mentioned in former times (until to about 30-40 years ago), namely that we are obliged to follow the marriage laws of the Church. Marriage is a sacrament and the Church is authorized by its very institution to administer and regulate the sacraments. Marriage is not a man-made institution but was established by God at our creation: Adam, on seeing the newly-created Eve, says "*This one, at last, is bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; This one shall be called 'woman,' for out of man this one has been taken.' That is why a man leaves his father and mother and clings to his wife, and the two of them become one body"* (Gen 2:23-24). While there are aspects of weddings that reflect various cultural sensibilities (e.g., a lasso, an exchange of coins, attire, etc.), the culture has no authority over what constitutes a marriage or how a wedding in celebrated.

That being said, the Baltimore Catechism taught the basics of the Church's marriage laws. 'To receive the Sacrament of Matrimony worthily it is necessary to be in the state of grace, and it is necessary also to comply with the laws of the Church. In receiving the Sacrament of matrimony we are bound to comply with whatever laws of the Church concern Matrimony; such as laws forbidding solemn marriage in Lent and Advent; or marriage with relatives or with persons of a different religion, and in general all laws that refer to any impediment to marriage' (Questions 1031 and 1032). There are laws governing the marriage between a Catholic and a protestant as well as between a Catholic and someone that is not baptized. The Church also forbids marriage between family members more closely related than second cousins. Likewise, both bride and groom must be free to marry, which encompasses their age, maturity, and whether or not either party has been married before. These are universal laws of marriage in the Church.

There are also local laws that might pertain to a given nation, state, or diocese. For example, in the Diocese of Birmingham, there is a mandatory six-month preparation period before the wedding can happen, the couple must be prepared in some appropriate manner, and the priest has the authority to delay a wedding if he deems one or both parties are not ready to marry. Our diocese likewise requires that all weddings must be celebrated in a church and that no weddings may occur on a Sunday. Exceptions can be made is some circumstances, if the cause is just. For example, a marriage may occur in Advent or Lent or when a bride or groom is not Catholic, but only with the permission of the bishop. Others are hard and fast laws that cannot be abrogated under any reason. No matter what, no marriage can be performed if a bride or groom is divorced from a previously valid marriage without an annulment nor can a wedding be celebrated outside of a church. These marriage laws are binding even though they are no longer listed among the Precepts of the Church.
