Being Sons and Daughters of God

The continuing rise of unbelief is troubling. First and foremost, it is troubling from the standpoint of how many souls are likely to be lost. Ever since Jesus walked among us there have been disciples that failed to attain heaven. Judas Iscariot certainly comes to mind. And Jesus warned us that there would be others, many of whom will be surprises. It will be a surprise to some who think they are right with the Lord but aren't and perhaps a surprise to their neighbors who might have regarded them as saintly shoo-ins. In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus warns his followers about this, saying "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but only the one who does the will of my Father in heaven. Many will say to me on that day, 'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name? Did we not drive out demons in your name? Did we not do mighty deeds in your name?' Then I will declare to them solemnly, 'I never knew you. Depart from me, you evildoers."' (Mt 7:21-23). In other words, the lack of belief can be reduced to either total unbelief or to insufficient belief, a lukewarm faith that is not accompanied by doing our heavenly Father's will. Sadly it is safe to say that total unbelief and lukewarm faith are rising year after year.

Secondly, lukewarm belief is dangerous not only to the individual believer but to those around him. It is easy to imagine that lukewarmness can be passed on to others through bad example and it seems unlikely that the natural tendency will be for lukewarmness to spawn deeper faith in others. In like manner lukewarm faith can and often does breed total unbelief in others. Widespread unbelief can be quite dangerous to whole societies, not just because the moral compass is often suppressed or warped, but because a new 'faith' will often supplant faith in God. Man seems preprogrammed to believe, and a vacuum of true faith will be filled with sort of other 'faith.'

Secular pseudo-religions such as nazism, communism, socialism, anarchism, and a whole bunch of other '-isms' come with their own objects of faith, doctrines, orthodoxy of thought, and provide an identity to adherents while imposing identities on those outside of the ideology. Great evils can and often do get foisted on the outsiders, as the events of the 20^{th} century prove beyond a doubt. The greater the number of people rejecting God and the greater then number whose faith is lukewarm, the more likely that man's inhumanity to man will be on full display.

However, we are now at a point where the number of people who reject God but embrace an '-ism' need not be large to have an enormously disproportionate impact on a society. While all '-isms' start small – how many nazis were there in 1920, how many bolsheviks were there in 1900? – they can grow enormously in number and power. However, destructive '-isms' today can wreak great havoc while remaining small in number. Traditional media, social media, widespread cowardice, wanting to get along, fear, and common lukewarmness greatly amplify the influence of even a small number of men pushing a godless agenda. For example, it has been estimated that as few as 1000 radical adherents of so-called transgender ideology, along with a bevy of useful idiots, have managed to promote their vile lies through coercion and reputation violence (e.g., canceling, ostracizing, name calling, slandering, threats, deplatforming, cyberbullying, and so forth) so as to make the idea that boys and girls can, nay ought be made into girls and boys. The media, the medical profession, politicians, and the aforementioned useful idiots, comply out of cowardice or for wanting to not be 'antiscience' even though there is no science to support the claims of these radicals. Most people know deep down that boys are boys and girls are girls. There is no spectrum of genders but there are spectrums of what is authentically boyish and what is girlish. A tomboy does not a boy make.

One of the consequences of unbelief, and to a lesser degree lukewarmness, is a loss of identity. Does a family deeply rooted in the Gospel fall for the idea that an ideology or other '-ism' truly provides us with a solid identity? Does a young man or a young lady with an active living faith really conclude that God put them in the wrong body? How godless does someone have to be to mutilate – irreversibly – children who are confused and have been led astray?
